S'áxt & Leukemia Research - New UAS chemistry professor, Dr. Brian Barth, has a longstanding connection with Alaska, extending back to his time as a grad student at UAF. It was in grad school that Brian met fellow student and chemist, Colin McGill, now the Chair of Chemistry at UAA. The two collaborated on a project studying the chemistry and traditional uses of low-bush kanat'á (blueberries). After that project concluded, they moved on to researching other indigenous medicine, including s'ikshaldeén (Labrador tea) and, most recently, s'áxt (devil's club). Brian's current research with Colin McGill, which has included the help of other colleagues and students at the institutions the pair has worked

with, focuses on studying sphingolipids in relation to myeloid leukemia, and testing the effect of various extracts and refined fractions of s'áxt on acute myeloid leukemia, various solid tumors, as well as inflammatory conditions. The research pair has published articles as their research has progressed, including their first publication in 2014 in *Phytotherapy Research*, and their most recent article, which is currently pending peer review and publication.

Entering her junior year, SamMi has had a varied path to and within UAS. She is currently majoring in both English and Environmental Studies with an emphasis in Literature and the Environment with a minor in Environmental Science. She has changed her major over a dozen times because, "I am interested in everything! Through the connections I've made with UAS' stellar English faculty, however, I have honed in my boundless interests into the interconnection between two disciplines that have historically been portrayed as opposites: the natural sciences and the humanities.

"Quantitative science is certainly vital to adapting to our changing environmental



and sociopolitical environments; this being said, I believe the roles of storytelling and language are overlooked in discussions surrounding environmental conservation. Much of our collective challenge lies in how our social and political narratives perpetuate disconnection from our shared Earth, which is most apparent in written policy and sociopolitical narratives (especially media).

"Throughout my degree, I strive to deeply study the natural processes of the Earth and how we, as human beings, connect or disconnect from our environment through storytelling, literature, and narratives. With my degree, there are many paths I'm considering, including education, conservation, and environmental law/policy."

In addition to her academic pursuits, SamMi is a student administrative assistant for the School of Arts & Sciences, and plans to revive the UAS Sustainability Club along with some of her fellow classmates, to create a collaborative space for learning and action.

Faculty Spotlight - Lily Hope

The School of Arts & Sciences is thrilled to have acclaimed weaver, Lily Hope, join UAS as full-time faculty, offering Fall 2023 courses in Natural Dye (ART 138), Beginning Northwest Coast Indigenous Design (ART 181), and Career Development for the Artist (ART 295).

Born and raised in Juneau, Alaska, Lily is Tlingit, of the T'akdeintaan clan. She is a lifelong artist, learning to sew at four years old, and helping her mother, master Chilkat weaver Clarissa Rizal, sew button blankets as early as eight years old.

Lily has been weaving for 28 years, creating art and teaching both Chilkat and Ravenstail styles. In that time, she has created three full-sized Chilkat blankets, two child-sized Chilkat blankets, a full set of children's Ravenstail regalia, and countless other pieces of regalia and art.

Her Chilkat face masks, originally intended to be a one-off nod to the COVID-19 pandemic, garnered national attention and appreciation, leading to a series of 37 Chilkat face masks. Three of the masks are part of her body of work on display in the Sharing Honor and Burdens: Renwick Invitational 2023 exhibition at the Smithsonian American Art Museum's Renwick Gallery.

Always an artist, Lily had a calling to teaching in 2009, after which she began to gradually pursue a Master's of Education. However, after the untimely passing of her mother in 2016, Lily was presented with the opportunity to teach through a grant from the Alaska State Council on the Arts. Finding her calling fulfilled through teaching the next generation of Chilkat and Ravenstail weavers, Lily has since taught numerous classes in dyeing, spinning, and weaving.

Some of Lily's brightest moments in teaching come when helping students approach their art from a mindset of growth and prosperity. Part of her teaching includes dispelling the societal myth that artists must struggle against poverty for the sake of their passion, instead supporting her students to see that they can find success and stability as professional artists. Lily is delighted when work done in class helps her students further their goals as professional artists
