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Tech Prep Articulation Agreement Between University of Alaska Southeast (UAS) and Ketchikan Gateway Borough School District (KGBSD)

Health Sciences School Year 2016-2017

Purpose:

In addition to the general Tech Prep Agreement, the purpose of this articulation agreement is to outline the mutual understanding as we have agreed to the following process and criteria with respect to the program of Health Sciences.

Course:

The school district program will follow a curriculum coordinated with the administration and faculty of UAS pertaining to the following course:

Health Science - Medical Terminology

HS S135 An introduction to root forms, prefixes and suffixes and medical abbreviations. Focus is on terminology of body systems related to symptomatology, diseases and treatment. 3 Credits (3+0) Prerequisite: High School Biology

Although teaching methods may differ, this course will be subject to the instructional objectives and outcomes of the attached UAS syllabus.

Administration:

- Students must have an overall 2.0 GPA to register for university credit.
- 2. It is recommended that course work be completed at a level of 3.0 GPA.
- Students must have successfully completed a full year of biology prior to enrolling in the Introduction to Health Science and Medical Terminology courses.
- Students must have achieved at least junior status in order to enroll in the Introduction to Health Science
 and Medical Terminology course.
- UAS program chairs shall review and approve all course syllabi and related curriculum documents to ensure they replicate the UAS course. This includes standardized course syllabi, course objectives, textbooks, tools, equipment, and methods for evaluation.
- To receive concurrent credit, the student will register for the Tech Prep course at the beginning of the term in which the competencies will be completed. Registration for yearlong courses will take place during the fall semester.
- 7. The UAS grade posted will be the UAS grade earned for the course and submitted by the district instructor.
- 8. Student grades will be submitted by 5:00 p.m. of the final day of the district semester at uaonline.alaska.edu.
- 9. Any change in instructor requires suspension of this addendum.

ASSIGNMENT AND GRADING INFORMATION

Attendance:

A major requirement for success in the work place is a strong work ethic. Arriving on time, being prepared and ready to participate is recognized in competency evaluations. This is the time to perfect your time management skills so that overall academic and work place performances are enhanced.

Students will be expected to attend every class. If unable to attend notify the instructor via email before class. There are no "excused" absences unless you have a doctor's note. It is the student's responsibility to request missed information.

Tardy: One point will be deducted from attendance for each tardy and /or leaving class early. Student will be considered tardy 10 minutes after the start of class.

Classroom attendance is scored 3 points for each class or 84 points in total.

Participation: Reading the assigned chapter should be done ahead of class so that you are familiar with the material. You are expected to contribute to class discussion, to ask questions, to collaborate with your classmates and participate in games. Your participation sets the learning milieu. Any quizzes given at the beginning of class will be part of your participation grade. Three points will be deducted from participation for each tardy/or leaving class early.

Participation carries a weight of 9 points for each class or 252 points in total.

Extra Credit

Popular press/literature article: Find an article in the newspaper or popular literature that includes a medical term. Bring the article to class to share. Be sure you know the meaning of the word so you can discuss your find! 12 points will be given for each article brought to class, with a limit of 2 articles total. **The articles are due by Monday April 13th, 2015.**

If opportunities to earn extra credit arise throughout the semester they will be discussed in class and posted on the announcement page.

Extra credits points will be applied to the categories in the following order: attendance, participation, quizzes, midterm, and then final.

Quizzes: There will be 11 open book quizzes during the semester. To take the quiz, log onto Blackboard, HS135-Jo1 and then find the appropriate quiz. To help you learn the content for each quiz, you should first read the chapters so you are familiar with the material, then take the quiz. You may print out the quiz to use as a study guide. The quiz will be graded upon submission giving you immediate feedback.

Exams: There will be 2 closed book exams, one midterm covering the first 12 chapters and the final exam covering the last 10 chapters. These paper and pencil tests will be taken in the learning center. The midterm is worth 15% of your grade and the final 15%.

RESEARCH PAPER

DUE Monday March 24th, 2015 @ 5:30pm, either hard copy or electronic.

Go to the library and select an article that is related to your presentation topic from a peer-reviewed health related journal, such as the American Journal of Nursing. After reading the article, write a 2 to 4 page paper to include:

- a one paragraph summary of the article
- at least 5 of the pertinent medicals terms
- their meaning and how knowing the terms helped you understand the article
- one paragraph discussion on how the information in the article impacts patient care
- works cited page

Using MLA format, the paper should be typed, double spaced using 12 point Times New Roman. If you have questions about how to set up you paper using MLA, please check out this website: http://oul.english.purdue.edu/owl/search.php

Grading criteria for paper:

10%- timeliness, 10 points will be removed for each day late, papers received after Wednesday will receive ½ the points with a maximum of 45 points.

20% - grammar, spelling, format

50%- content (5 points each medical term and meaning, 25 points for the summary)

10%- Works cited page

10%- a hard copy of the article

CLASS PRESENTATION OF A DISEASE OR CONDITION:

Individually, or in groups of two, research a diagnosis or condition that interests you. You should use at least 3 reputable online/library resources. Prepare, plan and organize a class presentation using the grading criteria listed below. Please email me your topic selection by Monday, March 2nd to prevent overlap of topics. Suggestion: Keep your topic small and manageable!

Topic Suggestions: In each chapter there are pathologic (disease) conditions listed. For Instance, if you are interested in heart attacks or heart disease, that topic is found in Chapter 11, Cardiovascular. You could use this brief description as a starting point for your research topic. If you are unsure of a subject please see the list of topics for suggested ideas on the class Blackboard website.

Presentation Grading Criteria:

- 20% Content (Suggested topics to include: causes and prevention, incidence, risk factors, signs and symptoms, pertinent tests, treatment, prognosis, complications, and information from your professional article assignment)
- 10% Include and discuss pertinent medical terms related to the topic.
- 10% Use of multimedia equipment/visual aids/1-2 minute YouTube videos.
- 10% Start and Stop on time (between 5 and 10 minutes per person)
- Professional presentation.

 Dress professionally!! Includes a professional appearance and poise (no gum chewing or wearing
 - hats).
- 10% Presentation presented on assigned day.
- Include a question in your presentation you specifically want students to learn. Write out the question, include it in your presentation and turn it in. This may be used on the midterm or final.
- 20% Copy of presentation, presentation question and "Works Cited" page in MLA format to be turned in on the day of your presentation. Spelling and MLA formatting will be included.
