

What is NWCCU?



- Ensures colleges and universities meet certain standards of quality
- Ensures that students receive a quality education that meets established standards
- Allows students to transfer credits more easily between institutions
- Allows students to access federal financial aid
- **UAS has been accredited by NWCCU since 1983.**

Current Accreditation Cycle



NWCCU 7-Year Cycle

- **7 Year Self-Study** (Spring 2019): Onsite review
Outcome: UAS was Reaffirmed with 5 commendations and 3 recommendations
- **Mid-Cycle Review** (Spring 2022): Virtual site visit
Outcome: NWCCU accepted the UAS mid-cycle report and determined prior recommendations to be Fulfilled
- **Year 6 PRFR** (Spring 2025): Report on Standard 2 – Policies, Regulations, and Financial Review (PRFR)
Outcome: Response was positive, with two Type 1 Findings
- **Year 7 EIE: Summative Evaluation of Mission Fulfillment** (Spring 2026): Report on Institutional Effectiveness (EIE)
Progress: Sent to NWCCU for initial feedback
- **7 Year Site-Visit** (Spring 2026): Onsite review

Concluding Comments

PRFR Findings from NWCCU Evaluation Committee

Standard 2.A.1

- Type I Finding: The Boards calendar for reviewing institutional and board policies and procedures
- NWCCU PRFR Committee Rationale: Board review schedules were not available to review and were not discoverable.

Standard 2.E.2

- Type 1 Finding: Sample of meeting agendas, minutes, and/or other documentation as evidence of meaningful opportunities for participation by stakeholders
- NWCCU PRFR Committee Rationale: Reestablishing the budget committee will aid better stakeholder engagement. Lacking evidence of meetings and stakeholder participation.






